Lesson 5

Materials:

- Sight word flashcards: friend, kind
- Sight Word Bingo Game
- Worksheet 5

Skills:

- Recognize the sight words: friend, kind.
 - ♦ Using flashcards, teach the sight words *friend* and *kind*. Review the previous sight word flashcards.
 - Play Sight Word Bingo.
 - Use the Sight Word Bingo Game, or make game boards using the sight words from Lessons 1-5.
 - Each player will use a game board.
 - Have the child choose one sight word card and read the sight word.
 - Cover the word with a panda marker or coin if it is on your game board.
 - The first player to cover five words in a row (may be horizontal, vertical, or diagonal), is the winner.

Review how to write and use possessive nouns.

- ◆ Ask the child, "What does plural mean?" (It means more than one.) "Do you remember how to make most words plural?" (Add an "s" to the end of the word.)
- → Tell the child that today he will review how to write and use possessives. To possess something means to own or have something. Possessive words show that a noun (a person, place, thing, or idea) owns something. To make a noun possessive, add an apostrophe s at the end of the word. If the word already ends in an s, just add an apostrophe.
- Use worksheet 5, part A to demonstrate how possessive nouns are used.
 - Have the child read the first sentence on worksheet 5, part A. Ask the child what does Steve have? (a brown dog) The sentence can be written using a possessive noun.
 - Have the child read the second sentence on the worksheet. Which word is the possessive noun?
 (Steve's)
 - Have the child read the next sentence. What belongs to Sis? (a book) Because Sis ends with an s, only an apostrophe is added at the end of the word.
- Say a noun. Have the child say a sentence using the noun as a possessive noun.

For example:

Parent: dog

Child: This is the dog's food bowl.

Continue listing nouns until the child can consistently use possessive nouns correctly.

Independent practice:

- Worksheet 5, part A: Read the sentences.
- Worksheet 5, part B: Read each sentence. Then rewrite it using a possessive noun.

Meg has a purple and pink bike. (This is Meg's purple and pink bike.)

Jim has a white tent. (This is Jim's white tent.)

James has a long, black snake. (This is James' long, black snake.)
